Pastor's Letter—March 2024

from Pastor Steve Bond

There are some movies I have watched dozens of times before-and I'll watch them dozens more times, no doubt. There are some books I keep coming back to over the years, even though I've already underlined my favorite lines and dog-eared the pages of the best passages. And, of course, our family cookbook opens up on its own to the most frequently made recipes, on pages that are now stained from bits of flour or water that crinkle the paper from all the times a few ingredients have spilled while making our go-to dishes. My guess is that you have had similar experiences, too, with your own favorite movies, novels, and recipes. We keep coming back to the stories that define us, the books that captivate us, and the foods that comfort us, even though they are no longer "new." Maybe the plot of a great movie doesn't surprise us the same way it did the first time we saw it on the big screen, but we are still drawn into the tension and twists as the characters go through them again. Maybe we already know what the soup will taste like, but we make it again exactly because we know we can count on it to nourish us on a cold night.

I find myself thinking of the story of Jesus' passion and the great drama of Holy Week the same way, honestly. We know the plot points. We know what lies beyond the joyful procession with palms and raucous shouts of "Hosanna!" on Palm Sunday. And we know, too, that on the other side of the sorrow that unfolds between Thursday's betrayal, Friday's cross, and Saturday's deathly silence, there is the unbridled hope of resurrection, too. These moments in The Story aren't new to us, but they do feed us like a favorite recipe. They do direct us still in our day and our times, like following the steps in The Joy of Cooking. When we find ourselves humbled by having our feet or hands washed on Maundy Thursday, we are challenged again to practice such self-giving love in our own daily lives. When we feel the cool metal of the nails and the rough wooden beams on Good Friday, we are brought up speechless in the light of God's love that went to a cross for us. When we hear the old, old stories of our faith woven together at the cross and empty tomb on Holy Saturday (a new tradition for us here at Community of Christ in the Easter Vigil) we see how God has moved through time and space to rescue and redeem us from the very beginning! And when we hear of Mary's coming to the tomb in shock and surprise before the risen Jesus, somehow, we are made new, too, even though we have heard the story countless times before.



In a way, all of our weekly worship as Christians—but especially during the events of Holy Week—is about letting God re-story us. We come to be reshaped in light of the broken bread of Jesus' table, the utter surrender of the cross, and the world-changing joy of the resurrection. We come to remember who we are, because of Whose we are. We come to be fed again with the sustenance of a meal we know will fill us. We come, even though we know the story, or maybe exactly because we know this Story, and the God who draws us into it.

In the rest of these weeks of Lent and then in Holy Week, we invite you to be drawn into these stories—the covenant stories of ancient Israel as part of our Wednesday night series, the stories of Jesus on his journey to the cross on Sundays in Lent, and the story of the cross and resurrection that makes everything new. Join us these days and let the living God re-story us.

Adult Sunday School in March: Baptized We Live (Lutheranism as a Way of Life)



Every Wednesday this Lent, you are invited to join us for midweek soup suppers, evening prayer services, and something new and experimental here at Community of Christ! Each week, gather at 6:00 p.m. for dinner in the fellowship hall (you can also still help contribute something to our weekly meals by adding your name to the date you can help at the sign-up on the kiosk in the Gathering Space). Between dinner and the start of our evening worship at 7:00 p.m., we invite you to participate in a weekly creative project where arts and spirituality meet and connect with our focus story for the week in worship. On our first Wednesday (Feb. 21) we made a giant-sized rainbow to connect with the end of the story of Noah and the Ark, where God gave the rainbow as a sign of the covenant not to destroy the earth. See each week what other kinds of creative connections we'll be exploring together as we learn and reflect on the other *covenant* stories in the overarching Story of the Bible, from Abraham and Sarah to the Ten Commandments and more. Long after you have washed the ashes from your forehead. we hope these crosses on canvas will remind you of the way each of us is marked with the cross of Christ in our baptism, and how Christ promises to share our whole life's journey as we follow him. Holy Week at Community of Christ

Our journey through Lent culminates in the drama, beauty, and passion of Holy Week, and you're invited to gather with us in worship for these special events and services this Holy Week (March 24-31).

Palm Sunday (8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.)—March 24

The story of Jesus' triumphal entry and revolutionary upside-down parade into Jerusalem begins Holy Week on Palm Sunday, and you'll be invited into the story yourself with palm branches and celebration at our usual two service times on March 24.

Eric Dickey's "Jazz Passion"—March 27, 7:00 p.m.

Join us for a special service concluding our Wednesday Lenten series with an arrangement of the Passion story of Jesus written by our own Eric Dickey and shared as part of evening prayer with a variety of instruments and voices, set in a jazz arrangement. Experience the story of Jesus' journey to the cross in a whole new way with the music and drama of this arrangement!

Maundy Thursday—Footwashing Forgiveness, and Holy Communion—March 28, 7:00 p.m.

On the night of Jesus' betrayal, John's Gospel tells us that he washed the feet of his disciples (including Judas!) and commissioned his followers to love one another with the same self-giving love that serves even in lowly positions. We are also told that on that same night, Jesus took the remaining bread and cup of the Passover meal and re-imagined it as the meal of his own body and blood that we call Holy Communion or the Lord's Supper. All of these moments point ahead to Jesus' act of self-giving love at the cross, and we are drawn into the story of it all on Maundy Thursday, as our worship includes the practice of foot or handwashing, the declaration of forgiveness, and the celebration of Holy Communion. Join us for this powerful night that begins the great Three Days (or Triduum) of the Holy Week story!

Good Friday—The Passion According to Saint John—March 29, 7:00 p.m.

We gather in worship to remember the story of Jesus' suffering and death, guided by the storytelling of John's Gospel, on Good Friday. Join us for a powerful service that brings each of us to the foot of the cross to witness and worship the Crucified One.

Holy Saturday—Easter Vigil—March 30, 7:00 p.m.

This is a new tradition for us at Community of Christ, but its roots are ancient and go back to the early centuries of Christian worship. On the night before Easter, we gather to retell the ancient stories of our faith, to kindle a new fire by which to light the Paschal Candle, to remember our baptism and renew our affirmation of living as the baptized followers of Jesus, and then to hear the first news of the resurrection! Our version of the Easter Vigil will be modified to be friendlier for families and children, too. Even though some versions of the Vigil of Easter begin in the middle of the night and last until dawn, ours will start at 7:00 p.m., beginning with the kindling of a fire outside and then leading inside where the art projects we've been making throughout Lent will be brought together as part of the Great Story of God, and we'll see our worship space transformed for the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus! And instead of lasting all through the hours of the night, this service will run about an hour and a quarter—still giving a chance to experience the power of the move from death to resurrection, but also letting families with younger children still participating. We hope you'll join us for this special event that is unlike any other service in the church's year!

Easter Sunday—The Resurrection of Our Lord

Join us for the all-out celebration of Jesus' resurrection from the dead, on Easter Sunday at both our 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. services!



Eclipse Day Gathering at Community of Christ (April 8, 2:30-3:30)



Community of Christ is hosting an Eclipse Watching Gathering this April, and this is a big deal, astronomically speaking! The last time there was a total solar eclipse in northwestern Ohio was more than two hundred years ago in 1806, so this is the chance of a lifetime to see the sun's light being covered by the shadow of the moon. If you're looking for a place to watch, you are welcome to come to the churchyard on Monday, April 8, where from 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. we'll be celebrating the day and observing the sky! We can't guarantee what the weather will be like on that day, and if it's cloudy our observations will obviously be limited, but if we get clear skies, this could be a wonder to behold! Since our local schools are off for the day. you won't be missing school, and we'll have some pairs of eclipse-viewing glasses available if you haven't gotten some on your own already (available in stores and online now, if you're interested in getting your own). Since our faith reminds us that God's love is even more faithful than the sun, since "there is no shadow of turning with thee", this is a chance to remember that even when the sun's light is covered up by the moon (or clouds) God's love is constant and ever-present—so it makes sense to be with us in the churchyard on a day like this! Join us on April 8 for Eclipse Day at Community of Christ!

Bed Build Event


Diverse Ministries Come Together for Bed Build

One of the things that's most exciting about our fiftieth-anniversary celebration this year is that we aren't just patting ourselves on the back but looking for ways to do good for our neighbors near and far as a part of this milestone in our church's history! And one of the biggest projects to do that is the Bed Build we're planning for April 6 (on site at the church in the parking lot, weather permitting). Partnering with a local Toledo-area organization that makes and distributes beds to kids in our region who are in need of beds, we're planning a blitz of building fifty (yep, 50!) beds in one Saturday morning!

But wait—there's more! As the idea of the Bed Build has been percolating throughout the congregation, we've seen groups and committees in the congregation get excited and want to add more to this project! So, our Material Girls quilting group is working on making quilts for some of those beds we build, and folks from Outreach are planning to make no-sew tie fleece blankets for the rest of those beds, so that we won't just be building bed frames and raising funds for the mattresses and pillows but will also be sending along handmade blankets or quilts for the children and youth in our area who receive them! That's amazing!

Remember that you can help support the Bed Build in a number of ways: you can sign up to help build on April 6, you can give a donation directly to the Bed Build project as part of our 50th anniversary campaign (see the display and envelopes in the Gathering Space, or just designate a line on your offering envelopes), or you can give a donation at our Lenten midweek meals, because all proceeds from those Wednesday dinners will also go to help fund the Bed Build, which will cost \$10,000 for all fifty beds! It's exciting to see our congregation coming together over a vision like this, and we hope you'll be a part of it!







Women (and men) have knitted and crocheted shawls to warm others for hundreds of years. But it wasn't until 1997 that the organized Prayer Shawl Ministry was started by two faithful New England women. Word spread quickly, and soon Prayer Shawl Ministry groups were forming around the world.

In 1921 our Visitation Ministry Team built on the prayer shawl group that had previously been active in our own congregation. In 2023, 23 shawls that had been created with prayer and blessed by our pastors were given to folks who would be comforted by them.

Do you enjoy the relaxation of knitting? Crocheting? If our Prayer Shawl Ministry is to continue and grow, we need your help! The pattern you choose can be simple or challenging. Need some ideas? 

LIFT to Celebrate Easter Vigil on March 30

LIFT will celebrate the Easter Vigil on March 30 at 7 PM at St. Mark Lutheran Church in Fremont. In the early centuries of Christianity, baptisms were only performed at one time a year—Easter Vigil. Persons new to Christianity—catechumens—were baptized at the Easter Vigil and welcomed into the faith. In preparation, the catechumens would have a period of preparation, usually involving prayer, fasting, and acts of charity. This time became Lent. For our LIFT vigil, we'll start outside around the fire, then process inside with candles to hear creative retellings of salvation Bible stories. We'll remember our Baptism and celebrate Holy Communion.

LIFT (Living in Faith Together) is a collaboration of congregations in the Fremont area, including Emmanuel, Faith, Grace, St John's and St Mark Lutheran Churches, and Hayes Memorial UMC. Their mission priorities are: Being present in the community, witnessing God's love, hearing the needs, serving our neighbor, and striving for justice.

One of their programs, *Bridge of Hope*, prepares welcoming baskets for migrant families of Sandusky County every April. Community of Christ is taking up this challenge the first four weeks of March and will be collecting items to help fill these baskets.

Migrant workers arrive with what they can carry, a backpack or a small bag. They only have enough room for a few clothes and a few personal items. Before they earn their first paychecks, they need some basic items to help them get started. The list contains the following items: laundry baskets, garden gloves (M-L), lightweight blankets, rubber overshoes, pillows, fans, long sleeve thin cotton pullover shirts (S-L), Baseball Caps with neck covering, Small coolers, bandanas, first aid kits, thin lightweight coveralls (S-L), sunscreen, water thermoses, shampoo and conditioner, coffee mugs, laundry detergent, fabric softener, lunch boxes, toilet paper, electric razors, bath towels/facet towels/wash clothes, sunglasses, toothpaste/toothbrushes, light raincoats/parkas (S-L), deodorant. As you can see, they need several practical items to allow them to work long days in the fields, seven days a week, in all types of weather!

I can picture Jesus and the Disciples, hanging out with the migrant workers: they are "foreigners", speak a different language, look different, are very poor, and are hated by many, just His type of people! Let's help *Make Jesus Known* to this marginalized community.
