Pastor's Letter—September 2024: The Way of Jesus

A lot of the time in life, it's not just what you do, but <u>how</u> you do it, that makes the difference.

When I was a kid taking piano lessons, I can remember the vast difference between what it sounded like when I played a piece of music and what it sounded like when my teacher would sit at the bench and play the very same notes. Even though the sheet music was identical, her interpretation—the *way* she played the music—almost made it sound like a different piece. My fingers might be hitting the right keys, but I hadn't yet learned to give expression to the music: the drama of getting louder and softer, the moments of rushing and the measures of emotional tension as the tempo slowed. I might bury the melody underneath the loud clunky chords of my left hand playing the harmony, or I might miss the accent of a sharp staccato. But she had learned how to be expressive—how to be *musical*—with the music. Even though we were playing from the same book, it was the *way* my teacher played that made the piano sing.

Maybe you've seen something similar when a particularly gifted actor takes the familiar lines of an old script for a play and brings the role to life in a whole new way. A bad actor can make Shakespeare into a terrible bore, but an insightful actor has a way of taking words that are centuries old and breathing new life into them, no matter how many times you've heard, "To be, or not to be..." before. Or maybe you've tasted the difference between a meal prepared precisely from the printed recipe and one prepared by a gifted cook who can somehow take the same ingredients and transform them into something remarkable. When you take that first bite, you know: sometimes the difference isn't <u>what</u> you do, but in the <u>way</u> you do it. That's true of any art, whether it is music, drama, dance, or skill in the kitchen.

And it is true, too, with the art of living. The followers of Jesus are convinced that his *way* of life is remarkable, and that somehow, he makes us more fully and really alive. It's like the difference between a beginning piano student who can only plunk out notes clumsily and a true musician who makes the melodies dance off the printed page (we get the chance to hear some of those around here at Community of Christ at the piano, and with our other talents musicians and vocalists, don't we?). It's like the difference between just going through the motions and performing an elegant dance with graceful artistry. It's the difference between just ticking off minutes... and hours... and years... of a lifetime and leaving an impact on the world because of our presence in it. The way of Jesus brings us into what the New Testament calls "the life that really is life" (1 Timothy 6:19).

And that's what our focus will be this month in our year-long project of "Meeting Jesus." This September, we'll take a deeper dive into the *way* of Jesus. In other words, we'll look at the *way* Jesus interacts with people, the *way* he faces adversity, the *way* he serves God, and the *way* he embodies God's Reign. In all of this we'll look, too, at how we live out our daily lives in light of the way of Jesus. How do we go to work in the way of Jesus? How do we use our time and our money like Christ? How do we make small talk with strangers at the post office or in line at the grocery store in ways that embody Jesus for our neighbors? How do we love the way Jesus loves? If that conversation intrigues you, and if you have that hunger to be a part of "the life that really is life," then join us throughout the month of September here at Community of Christ to explore the *way* of Jesus.

Greetings Community of Christ Lutheran Church!

My name is Natalie Downs, and I will be your vicar! First off, I want to start by saying thank you. Some other tidbits about me: I have degrees from Otterbein College (now University- Bachelor of Music) and Michigan State University (Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts). 


### Contribute to the Time Capsule at Blue Jean Sunday

### Save the Date—God's Work, Our Hands Sunday Service Project on Sep. 22


Every year each September, congregations in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), our church body, are dared to take on a service project of some kind to help celebrate the anniversary of the ELCA. Last year, we had an outing to Urban Wholistics garden in downtown Toledo, and this year, we are planning an outing for all willing hands to help plant trees for our friends at Salem Lutheran Church in the North End of Toledo. Stay tuned for details about times and carpooling plans, but for now you can save the date for the **afternoon of Sunday, September 22**, departing from the church at **12:30 p.m.** with a group meeting from Community of Christ and traveling together for an afternoon of caring for God's creation and partnering with neighbors in the North End!

Pastor Mike Hanck from Salem shares this about the need for tree planting to improve the health and wellbeing of the neighborhood around Salem:

"Recently, the Department of Public Utilities amounts of concrete and - especially - the lack of an urban tree canopy. Even in comparison with other areas of the City of Toledo did a study on Urban Heat, and Salem's neighborhood was listed as one of the hottest. Temperatures here can climb to more than 10\* hotter than most other areas. The reason for this? The vast as ours is one of the worst in terms of heat. Additionally, beatification and urban blight are continual worries for engaged residents of our area. Since 2016, in some way, various ways, Salem has been addressing these issues. It began with a park, James Colbert Park, and has increased to an expanding mini-arboretum project. It used to be that Pr. Mike, and the staff and members of Salem would just add a few trees each year, but as of late, it's seemed wiser to them to do large batches of trees at one time, since then, one only needs to worry about how the trees are doing at one time instead of new ones every year. With this influx of trees, not only will we physically alter and remake our part of the neighborhood, but we will drastically add to the tree canopy in a way that none of us have ever done before. Once the trees begin to grow, this will feel like an entirely new area. The trees for this project will fill out the park, fill out the first stage (of three stages) of the arboretum. It will also pave the way for further investment of trees by the City of Toledo and Salem's National Wildlife Foundation partners. Remember, when, in the Book of Genesis, God had created plant and animal life, God was able to turn and say, 'It is good.' It is our bet that we all too will be able to come back and say the same thing as these trees grow."

We hope you'll consider supporting this project *either* by **volunteering** to help with planting on Sep. 22 or **donating** money toward the cost of the trees—you can make a special donation through a line item in your offering envelope, or through our special collection display in the Gathering Space on Sundays!

We're asking for you to complete those and return them to the church **by October 15**, so that we can get new volunteers connected with the ways they are being led to serve, and so that we can make our proposed 2025 budget grounded in realistic expectations of our planned giving.

Well, that's why we're also offering this September a Spiritual Gifts Workshop coming up on September 14<sup>th</sup> (see the article here in this newsletter for more details!), where you can learn more about your own talents and gifts, and you can explore what kinds of serving connect best with your gifts! And in case you've been asking, "What are the places we need volunteers for here at Community of Christ?" well, good news there, too! At our Sept. 28 Festival of Talents (and on Sunday, Sept. 29 between services, too) we'll have displays representing each of the areas of ministry in our congregation so you can learn more about what we do and how you can be a part of it. Think of it like a career fair or college expo but for serving God and God's people—check out the displays for each ministry at Community of Christ, and let that help guide where you might serve in the year ahead! It's all about opening up the gifts God has already given us!


### Here is the schedule for 2024-2025:



### **Prairie Meadow Update**

Summer has brought more blooms in the Prairie Meadow – Black Eyed Susan, Blue Vervain, and Partridge Pea are the most common seedlings in bloom, along with the plants rescued from the Buehner Center at Oak Openings last fall, and of course our 6 healthy sunflowers! The Sacred Grounds Prairie tour was here on Aug 7<sup>th</sup>, with 20 + attendees being inspired by our efforts to be good stewards of God's World. We will continue our battle of the weeds that have sprung up and flourished from the seed bank later this summer/fall with repeated tall mowing. If you have not had a chance to visit the Prairie Meadow close and see and hear the pollinators, please take a short walk out for a visit. But since we currently have many small seedlings still coming up late in the summer, please enjoy it from its edges.

We recently learned that the very healthy and well-developed prairie at Oak Openings Heavy Wheelhouse would be converted in part to a playground, our request to rescue some plants was granted by Metroparks. Becky King and Laurie Mauro made a combined 6 trips to Heavy to dig out and transplant around **72 very large native plants** for our prairie. In addition, we were able to collect some seeds that can also be used to supplement our native seed bank. The Metroparks native staff was disheartened that one of their most well-developed prairies was planned to be lost, so they were very happy that we were able to use the plants, and we are extremely grateful that we heard of the possibility in time to rescue the plants and transplant them to enrich our native plot. They should provide a nice addition of more mature plants, that should be notable next spring and summer.
