Pastor's Letter, November 2024—The Victory of Jesus

It's late October as I write this—still two weeks away from Election Day but I can tell you with confidence even now that the victory that matters most has already been won. I can't tell you, as I'm sitting down to my keyboard at my desk, who has won which contests, which party will have a majority in Congress, or which local and state ballot measures will have been passed. But I don't have those in mind for the moment. When I say that the victory that matters most has already been won, I'm not talking about the U.S. Senate or the presidency or issues for our schools or libraries (as much as I care about things like those, and I know you do as well). I mean to say that for us as Christians, our hope is pinned not on whether Democrats or Republicans (or for that matter, the Whig Party or the Know-Nothings) win more races on the first Tuesday in November, but on the victory, God has already accomplished in Jesus through the cross and resurrection, by which the powers of death, sin, hatred, and evil have been defeated. To borrow a cliché you've probably heard already, our hope is ultimately not in donkeys or elephants, but in a Lamb. And of course, part of what makes Jesus' victory so surprising and countercultural is that it hasn't been won by crushing his enemies, building an empire, or amassing a political machine, but by dying on a Roman cross and rising from a borrowed tomb. We are people who believe that the victory of Jesus is the victory that matters most of all in the cosmic scheme of things, even as local and national elections come and go, and even as empires and superpowers arise and crumble on the stage of world history. That perspective changes everything for us.

In this final month of the church year, which for us has been focused on "Meeting Jesus" throughout 2024, we'll center our attention on the theme of *The Victory of Jesus*, and maybe it is especially appropriate for us to do that even during the month of our election and the weeks that will follow after it, with all the excitement for some and disappointment for others that it will bring (and probably for all of us, relief just at the end of the barrage of ads that have bombarded us). This month brings us the Feast of All Saints, which is always a celebration of God's promised welcome to all those who have gone before us in the faith and are already at God's feast of victory. And it ends with the celebration of Christ the King Sunday, a festival in the church's year that reminds us what an upside-down kind of king we have in Jesus, who reigns from a cross and who doesn't come to conquer or tyrannize but to bring us to life in him. While I don't know the details of what will make the headlines after Election Day this year,

I do know that this is exactly the victory—Jesus' cross and resurrection—that we will need most of all to pin our lives on. And I know that because of that victory we have confidence in God's ultimate triumph and the promise of new creation where death is destroyed, tears are wiped away, and we join with all creation in praise of the Slain but Living Lamb.

Looking back on the course of this past year of "Meeting Jesus," I hope it has been valuable for you to spend time, season by season and month by month, on Big Ideas like the *cross* of Jesus, the *table* of Jesus, the *way* of Jesus, and the *love* of Jesus. Now, I invite you to let this month give you renewed hope for whatever is in store for us because of the *victory* of Jesus—a victory which has already been won, and which makes all things new.

Grateful for all of you and the ways we share together in that victory over death and sin, Pastor Steve

What is "All Saints' Day"?

Every Sunday in the Creed, we affirm our belief in "the communion of saints," which is so, a shorthand for saying we believe that we remain connected to all the people of God from every time and place, not just around the world now, but including those who have died and gone before us to be in the fullest presence of God. We believe that death does not cut us off from them, but rather we are together the mystical body of Christ. And so, on All Saints' Day, we specially remember those from our own congregation who have died in the past year as well as lifting up the names of other departed loved ones whom we trust are in God's care and to whom we remain connected. Here at Community of Christ, we'll also have a table in the back of the worship space with photos of those who have died in the past year from our congregation, and candles lit to honor the ways they let their lights shine in the world as well.

The old Lutheran Book of Worship's Manual on the Liturgy adds these historical notes: custom of commemorating all the martyrs of the church on a single day goes back at least to the third century. In the East, the celebration is still on the Sunday after Pentecost (which is Trinity Sunday in the West). When the festival was introduced in the West it was kept first on May 13, the date of the dedication of the rebuilt Roman Pantheon to St. Mary and All Martyrs. In modern practice, All Saints' Day commemorates not only all the martyrs but all the people of God, living and dead, who form the mystical body of Christ." Today, the Festival of All Saints is marked on November 1, or in congregations like ours, on the first Sunday in November as "All Saints' Sunday." (This is also why October 31, the evening before the Festival of All Saints, is sometimes called "All Hallows' Eve," or in abbreviated form, "Halloween.") And as a bit of bonus Lutheran trivia, the reason we celebrate Reformation Sunday as the last Sunday in October is to make the connection to Luther posting the Ninety-Five Theses on that same date, Oct. 31, 1517. For him, the timing was intentional—his theses posted to the Wittenberg door had to do with the status of those who had died (and included things like whether there was a place called "purgatory" for the sins of dead Christians to be purged away, and whether the good deeds of other people could be "applied" to someone else's account to get them "out" of purgatory, all of which Luther critiqued as unscriptural, and thus beginning the movement we now call the Protestant Reformation.

We hope you can join in worship on Nov. 3 as we celebrate the Good News that God promises to gather us with all the followers of Jesus as the people of God in God's resurrection feast of victory, where even death itself will be destroyed!



Christ the King



What is "Christ the King Sunday"?

The church's way of keeping time is always blessedly weird—we might as well just own that. While we might complain that consumerist culture around us is rushing too fast by putting out Christmas displays as soon as the Halloween candy has been moved to the discount bin, the church is So, of the curve as we mark the end of our "year" with the celebration of "Christ the King Sunday," preparing for the start of a new church year with Advent while the rest of the world's calendars still have a month to go. It's delightfully out of step, and that's part of the beauty of Christ the King Sunday. This day is set apart in the church's year to skip to the "end of the story," so to speak, and to remind us of Christ's promised coming in glory and reigning in justice and mercy. It is a reminder that even though empires, nations, kings, and administrations come and go throughout history, God wins in the end and Jesus is Lord. And yet—and this is the hilarious punch-line of God's divine comedy!—Jesus' way of reigning and being king looks nothing like what the world expects from kings and rulers. Jesus doesn't conquer with armies, and he doesn't destroy his enemies with furious spite or insatiable wrath—rather, he prays God's forgiveness on the very ones crucifying him, loves his enemies, and defeats the Last Enemy (death itself!) by dying, not by killing. Jesus' way of reigning doesn't look like the conquering war hero or the brutality and bullying of a tyrant. It looks like an itinerant rabbi holding dinner parties with the "sinners and tax collectors." It looks like a towel and basin of water to wash feet, to serve rather than being served. It looks like a cross. That beautiful, mind-boggling paradox is what Christ the King Sunday is really all about.

Historically, a date on the church's calendar to focus on Christ's reign is pretty recent, even though the idea of Jesus as a surprising king is right there in the New Testament. This festival was first proposed by our Roman Catholic siblings when Pope Pius XI in 1925 proposed it in the face of rising fascism and communism in Europe. And in that sense, Christ the King Sunday is simply one more expression of what the earliest Christians knew: when they confessed "Jesus is Lord" it was a statement that nobody else—not Caesar, not a Pharaoh, not a human king, earthly government, or demagogue of the day—was Lord.

As our online worship resource, "Sundays and Seasons" puts it powerfully, "Jesus redefines what power is and what people think God's power looks like to fight evil and suffering in the world. Jesus does not resist the way of the cross with force. Rather than protecting himself from harm in any way, the vulnerable King Jesus dares to demonstrate God's love for all people. Jesus does not run from pain, anguish, or suffering. Rather, the risen Jesus, 'the ruler of the kings of the earth' (Rev. 1:5), rushes to the places of disaster and suffering in the world. Jesus goes where storms are ravaging and have ravaged lives and brings life and calm into the chaos."

So, this November 24, join us in worship for Christ the King Sunday, in order to be surprised yet again at the glorious surprise of a king who reigns from a cross, and whose kingdom is grounded in love. Come and be reminded of the good news at the end of the story: God wins, and God's victory looks like a cross and an empty tomb.




Currently, I am enrolled in Spiritual Practices at Wartburg, where we explore and practice as a group various spiritual exercises and meditations. Early October, I decided to do a spiritual practice focused on praying with origami. I prepared all the materials (origami paper, string, needle) and mailed them out to everyone in my class, so that after learning how to make an origami dove, they can make their own mobile of doves to hang somewhere as a reminder of God's presence with them. As excited as I was to share one of my own spiritual practices, I was not sure how this would go - it either was going to be something fun that people would love or something that was going to be an absolute disaster teaching how to fold origami over zoom. As I was composing my reflection for class, I realized that seminary and even our own spiritual lives can be like learning origami. Our journey with God is not always a straight path where we know all the instructions or information to get to the creative end, yet we can get frustrated, weighed down, and dismayed when we don't feel we measure up to expectations or are not yet where we feel we should be. Sometimes it takes time to learn and grow with God, to be patient with ourselves. And with others, that can be the same case. They are learning and growing too, and so our practice of patience and grace even extends outside of ourselves. The first time I folded a dove was a mess. It took time to learn the right ways to line up the paper and make sure that I was careful in bending and folding in a way that didn't tear the paper. Something I learned through this process about myself (and something that was echoed by my colleagues after the practice) is this exercise of creative prayer invited us into a space of being gentle with ourselves and one another in the process of learning.

Sometimes we are our own worst enemies. We can be hard on ourselves when we don't get it right, or we don't feel we add up to other people's standards and expectations. God though, who is generous in love and forgiveness, is gentle with you. You are made new by Jesus' sacrifice and the work of the Holy Spirit. God doesn't keep a scorecard to determine if you are worthy of love. As God's creation, you are already loved and accepted and redeemed through the cross of Christ. Our neighbors, known to us and unknown, are also learning and being shaped on this journey and are in need of God's grace and ours as well. Patience and gentleness with ourselves and others is a way to walk in the grace of God. We live in the reality of the cross and the rhythm of confession and forgiveness, where God meets us in our weakness to bring grace-filled wholeness, allowing us to renew our steps and walk once again, changed and made new. I love the Message translation of Colossians 3 that expands our imagination to see that grace-filled living is something we put on daily and has means to impact ourselves and the world. In all you do, be gentle with yourself and others, trusting that God's garment of love, given to you freely makes you and others enough in God's eyes.




Adult Sunday School Series "On The Other Hand..." Coming This November

- What do we do when one Bible verse says one thing, and another verse seems to say another?
- When we die, are we waiting for a future resurrection, or are we immediately with God right away?
- How do we understand the times when Jesus take a law from the Old Testament and then says, "But I say to you" and adds something different?

Maybe you've found yourself asking questions like these, or others where you didn't know what to do with the tension we sometimes hear within the different voices of the Bible. How do we know what to do, and how do we make sense of the Bible when we seem to be dealing with writers who say different things? And when I come across those in the Bible, should I be worried... confused... afraid... or relieved? Let's explore some of these kinds of situations together in a new series for the late fall in our Adult Sunday School forum (meeting in the fellowship hall from about 9:10-9:50), which we're calling, "On the Other Hand..." We'll do some case study exploration of times when different Bible passages seem to point in different directions on the same subject, and different ways that we might understand what's going on in them. The goal is not just to better understand these individual passages or issues, but to grow as Bible readers to become better at wrestling blessings from the texts where we are convinced God is speaking to us through ancient voices. 
Faith and Friendship





Prairie Meadow Update

As fall winds down we continue to see late blooms of our native plants. Currently blooming Black-Eyed Sneezeweed, Yarrow, Asters, and Black-Eyed Susan. In addition, seed heads of summer blooming plants are developing into their own important works of God's creation. Tall thimbleweed, although only a relatively unimpressive small green flower resembling a thimble in summer, develops into a unique seed head resembling an exploding mass of lamb's wool. Stop out and enjoy the new scenery.

It has become apparent that the Prairie Meadow is the recipient of donations of large amounts of common milkweed seed pods. This is a reminder that the plot should only be seeded with seed of known genetic make up of Oak Openings regions plants of a known source, either the Metroparks seed nursery or other known sources of Oak Openings region seeds. Keeping the plot seeded with plants of genetic make up known to be of this very specific region helps keep the nearby Metroparks native seed cultivation fields well as the local Oak Openings Region from being genetically compromised. Please chat with Laurie Mauro regarding donations of seed to the Prairie Meadow plot and refrain from donating/depositing seed in the plot without prior approval.


