THE READINGS

The First Reading: Genesis 2:15-17; 3:1-7

¹⁵ The LORD God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. ¹⁶ And the LORD God commanded the man, “You may freely eat of every tree of the garden, ¹⁷ but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die.”

^{3:1} Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, “Did God say, ‘You shall not eat from any tree in the garden?’” ² The woman said to the serpent, “We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden, ³ but God said, ‘You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die.’” ⁴ But the serpent said to the woman, “You will not die, ⁵ for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.” ⁶ So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food and that it was a delight to the eyes and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. ⁷ Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked, and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

The Second Reading: Romans 5:12-19

¹² Just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned ¹³ for sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. ¹⁴ Yet death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those who did not sin in the likeness of Adam, who is a pattern of the one who was to come.

¹⁵ But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man’s trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. ¹⁶ And the gift is not like the effect of the one man’s sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the gift following many trespasses brings justification. ¹⁷ If, because of the one man’s trespass, death reigned through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the gift of righteousness reign in life through the one man, Jesus Christ.

¹⁸ Therefore, just as one man’s trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man’s act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. ¹⁹ For just as through the one man’s disobedience the many were made sinners, so through the one man’s obedience the many will be made righteous.

About this Piece

On August 25th, 2024, I began my pastoral internship at Community of Christ Lutheran Church under the supervision of the Rev. Stephen Bond. One of the first services that I served alongside him in a leadership role was Sunday, September 8th, 2024 at the annual Blue Jean Sunday service, held outdoors. In the sermon for that day, Steve preached on Mark 7, about the deaf man with a speech impediment. Jesus' healing included a sigh to heaven, and speaking the word "Ephphata," meaning to be opened. Steve opened his sermon by sharing his love of dandelions and how he did not think of them as a weed, but an important part of God's creation, which tied nicely to the sermon text.

On May 6th, 2025 (which happened to be my birthday), I noticed that Steve posted this poem, "God of All Unwanted" on his Facebook page, and it reminded me of the Blue Jean Sunday sermon reflection on dandelions. It is a poem that stuck with me, and I read over and over on my own, dwelling in the beauty of God's love that never lets us go. Slowly over the summer, some music began to come to mind with the text, and I started writing the scratch notes on manuscript paper, originally thinking I would write it as a solo. After sitting with it a bit, I felt that the poem deserved to be highlighted through an SATB setting, that would provide more emotional depth and color to uplift the text. My hope is that the depths of Steve's poems and theological reflection are lifted and fully realized within the musical interpretation of the text. A reminder to us all that the things that we may think as insignificant and not important are not so in God's eyes, and that we are invited to see with open eyes God's grace for all creation. That we are invited to a life that allows us through God's grace to see others as loved by God.

Looking backwards and reflecting on that Blue Jean Sunday to today, I can't help but notice the Holy Spirit's work in the midst of my own experience and internship. At a time when I felt that my own voice was closed off, at times feelings maybe I am unwanted in my own ministry experiences, Steve's proclamation in preaching and poetry was my own "ephphata" moment. His images, words, theological reflection worked over me these past 18 months of ministry, and I feel that my own voice and eyes have been opened. I am deeply grateful for the work of artists and pastors such as Steve who have a special gift to preach the good news and life-giving grace of Jesus Christ in creative ways.

The choir at Community of Christ was more than willing to perform this piece to share it with the congregation on my last Sunday, February 22nd in worship. It is my gift to Pastor Steve as I take my leave from the congregation. I pray that all who hear Steve's words along with the music are blessed by the message, and that the Holy

Spirit will continue to open our eyes to the world that God loves, and our voices to praise God and uplift our neighbor.

About this Liturgy

In the Spring semester of 2025, I took a Living Liturgies class with Dr. Jan Schnell at Wartburg Theological Seminary, one of the advanced worship requirement courses for my Master of Divinity Degree. For our final project, we were instructed to put together a liturgy for a season of our choosing, and I decided to do a midweek Lenten tangible worship experience. As I was working on this, music started to come to mind, and I decided to start writing it down. The final project included written liturgy along with the music in this setting.

The music inspiration has come from a variety of sources. First, I decided to dedicate the opening song, “We Turn To You (Teshuvah),” to my dear professors Drs. Winston and May Persaud. May was my Hebrew language instructor throughout my time at Wartburg, and I have learned much from her in translation and biblical interpretation. Much of my own interpretation of the Hebrew scriptures is influenced from her pedagogy and care over the scriptures. Winston was my Systematics professor, who helped to provide instruction on the church doctrine, and who also had a deep love of the Joint Declaration of the Doctrine of Justification, a joint agreement between the Catholic Church and Lutheran World Federation on resolved disputes over the topic of justification by grace through faith. Both of these teachers were influential to my overall seminary education, and I am deeply changed by their instruction and care. In this particular song, I have included the Hebrew word, Teshuvah, meaning repentance. The root of the word comes from the verb shuv (שׁוּב), meaning turn, or turn back. Similar to the Lenten 40 days, Teshuvah is a Jewish celebration (also 40 days) about repentance, ending on Yom Kippur. Including the word “teshuvah” in the soprano descant is purposeful. Not only as a language geek, who will cram in biblical words when I can, but also to add to the expansiveness of the liturgical language, and our shared views on the value and renewal of turning back to God.

The sending hymn was composed with Community of Christ Lutheran Church in mind, my pastoral internship site. I have always loved folk music, especially of Irish and Scottish variety, so there is a flavor of that in this hymn, especially with the added strings. Community of Christ is a relatively younger church, just a little over 50 years old, and started as a mission development church site. And one of the traditions

that have carried on in this congregation at the sending is the reminder “Next week...Bring a Friend!” This hymn is a thank you to the congregation and their willingness to serve Christ and the church through various gifts and their warm hospitality. They have been a blessing to me in this time of internship, and I will always treasure the ministry we did together in my heart, remembering how it shaped and formed me as a leader today.

My prayer is that this liturgy be a source of comfort and inspiration on the journey of faith. Lent is all about journeys, and sometimes those journeys can be hard and troubling. We have a God, though, who goes with us on the journey. Who doesn't abandon us along the road but is there every step of the way. May the peace of Christ reign in our hearts as we once again walk the road to the cross with him and meet him also at the empty tomb.
